## **General**

1. The United Service Institution of India (USI) will conduct **two** courses for the IAF officers to assist officers of the IAF to prepare for the Defence Service Staff College (DSSC) Entrance Examination to be held in July 2026. They are **Correspondence Course** for Military History & Employment of Air Power (CA) and Current Affairs, National Security & Geopolitics (MH) as also an **ONLINE** course for CA only. The courses have been modeled with a simple **registration process**, wherein an officer can **register for the course on internet**. Officers are advised to go through USI of India website **Courses Vertical** for details.

## **Aim**

2. The aim of the **Correspondence** Course and the **Online** Course is to assist IAF officers to prepare for DSSC Entrance Exam in a systematic and comprehensive manner, through guidance, correction and lectures including issue of study material.

## **Syllabus and Subjects**

3. The **syllabus** as intimated by Air HQ is attached as **Appendix 'A'** for your reference.
4. The following **subjects** will be covered:-
  - (a) Military History and Employment of Air Power (MH and AP).
  - (b) Current Affairs, National Security and Geopolitics (CA).
5. Fee structures are as under:-
  - (a) **Military History & Emp of Air Power - Correspondence Mode.**
    - (i) Course fee - Rs 3000 + \*Rs 1500
  - (b) **Current Affairs, National Security & Geopolitics.**
    - (i) **Correspondence Course Fee** - Rs 3000 + \*Rs 1500
    - (ii) **USI DSSC ASPIRE 2026 (ONE & TWO) ONLINE Course Fee** - Rs 2500 + \*Rs 1500 (early bird incentive of Rs 250/- for registration by **22 November 2025** and **25 April 2025** for ASPIRE ONE & TWO respectively).
  - (c) Register by e-mail earliest and pay by Link provided/ Net banking to gain max benefit. See USI of India website 'Courses' sub-section under 'Sections' vertical.

**Note.** \* Rs 1500 is the USI Course membership fee if not a Life/ Ordinary member already. To be paid only once for the year which will cater for both subjects and type of courses.

## **Duration**

6. (a) The **Correspondence** course will be conducted from 2nd week of **December 2025** to second week of **June 2026**. The entrance examination is scheduled in July 2026.
- (b) **USI DSSC ASPIRE ONE & TWO (CA Leg for IAF)** will be held in the **first half** of **December 2025** and **May 2026** respectively.

## **Conduct**

7. The courses are essentially oriented towards preparing you for a competitive examination in a planned and sequential manner. The conduct of the **correspondence** course is through dispatch of test papers for all/chosen subject(s) at regular intervals. These test papers are set by experienced DS who are updated, on the pattern of the actual examination and cover all important aspects of subject(s) in a graduated manner. **Online** classes of USI DSSC ASPIRE ONE & TWO for the IAF officers who subscribe for it will be conducted for CA along with Army Officers. This will involve presentations on current topics and Question Answer Sessions for clarifying doubts. Dates for CA leg of USI DSSC ASPIRE 2026 ONE & TWO will be intimated later.

8. **Study Material.** Apart from question and answers, Specially prepared add on study material will be issued to all **Correspondence Course & ASPIRE ONE & TWO** registrants. It may be appreciated that this material is only to assist comprehension and does not claim to substitute the prescribed/recommended books/periodicals/publications. **Sharing or proliferation** of study material with others who are **not** registered with the USI of India for **this course is unfair practice.** Details below :-

(a) **CA.**

(i) International & Domestic Scene – Commencing from quarter Oct-Dec 2025. The updates will be sent every quarter after commencement of the course.

(b) **MH.**

(i) Handouts are planned to be issued for some of the **important** campaigns in the syllabus.

(ii) Some Pamphlets may also be issued.

(iii) Link for latest IAF Doctrine to be downloaded from Internet.

(c) The officers undertaking the USI DSSC ASPIRE 2026 TWO Course will be issued a **Mock Test** paper to write and have it corrected along with a suggested answer.

9. The USI may issue some relevant study material mainly on current issues to the student officers as soft copies.

### **Correction of Papers**

10. To derive full benefit from the **Correspondence Course**, students should answer the test papers under exam/near exam conditions and send their answer books to USI of India for correction by the Directing Staff (DS). Guidance contained in **Appendix 'B'** should be noted while answering questions in the test paper(s).

11. The answer papers on receipt at the USI will be corrected by experienced and qualified instructors and returned to the concerned student. Suggested answers will be sent along with other course material. You would appreciate that merely reading an answer can never teach you how to answer a given question in required No of words, in given time. Hence, the importance of writing.

### **Interactive Nature**

12. The Courses has been **modeled on 'Interactive Nature'**. **Enrolment to correspondence/Online courses entitles the students, free of cost detailed clarification and amplification on subject(s) raised by the students via emails.** All such correspondence/email should be addressed to the Director Courses of USI of India in the mail add provided quoting their course **Index No** and **Mob Nos.** Answers to common questions may be issued as handouts.

### **Tentative Course Material Dispatch Schedule for Correspondence Course**

13. One set of Question Papers each will tentatively be dispatched every month from **Jan** to **May** 2026. In all **five** sets will be dispatched. **Last** Current Affair Paper will be sent in **June 2026** to cover issues as late as possible.

### **Dispatch of Course Material**

14. Course material will be dispatched by Registered / Speedpost. **The USI will not be responsible for any loss of material.**

15. Ensure **correct address** given to the USI of India during registration. This is expected to avoid loss of study material, facilitate tracing, fixing accountability for the delay and enable you to track the dispatch online through tracking ID based on Mob No given.

### **Change of Address**

16. **Change** of address should be notified to the Director Courses USI of India **well in advance** or **immediately** on occurrence by **email**. This is very important as otherwise the course material is likely to get delayed or even get misplaced.

## Withdrawals

17. **First and Foremost**, please check and ensure your **eligibility** (as per your service condition) for **particular course**. Withdrawal from a course is **NOT** normally permitted. However, if a student is unable to continue the course, either due to major health issues / exigencies of service or circumstances beyond his/her control, the withdrawal request may be considered, on a **case to case** basis. In such cases, the student will be required to: -

- (a) Make an application giving detailed reasons for withdrawal from the Online/ Correspondence course.
- (b) Return all the study material issued to him/her.
- (c) Pay actual expenses incurred by USI. This amount will be decided by the USI in each case. The decision of USI will be final.
- (d) No refund will be allowed to a student if he wishes to withdraw from the Correspondence Course after two months of its commencement.

18. In the event of a student's withdrawal from a course, Course Membership fee will **not** be refunded. After deducting appropriate amount as per sub para (c) above and after receipt back of the study material, the balance **may** be refunded, at the discretion of USI of India.

19. In case the course is cancelled due to any reason, fees paid may be refunded to the extent decided by USI of India.

## Security and Copyright

20. The course material issued to officers is the **copyright of USI of India, New Delhi**. Its **reproduction** by any means and/or further **proliferation/sharing** with others under any **condition** is **prohibited**. It is issued to **indl officers only for their personal use, who are resp for its security**. Sharing with others who have not **regd** with USI for that course, amounts to **Unfair Prac. The Precis will be watermarked with Index Nos to fix accountability in case of any proliferation**.

## Correspondence

21. As **only** individual members can take the USI correspondence courses (and **NOT units/libraries/ formations**), officers should correspond with USI of India in their individual capacity and **not** through units. Units/formations **cannot** subscribe to a course for/on behalf the officer(s) of the unit; this will be an infringement of the USI rules.

**GUIDANCE FOR ANSWERING TEST PAPERS**

1. General Instructions for answering test papers of all subjects are given below:-
  - (a) Write your No, rank, name and Index No and Mobile No on the top right hand corner of your answer book. Leave the rest of the page blank.
  - (b) Do not write on the first page of the answer book. The DS will use it for writing his personal comments on your effort.
  - (c) Write only on one of the answer sheet. Opposite side will be used for answer wise comments.
  - (d) All questions normally will be obligatory unless indicated in the test paper.
  - (e) Answer the questions in their serial order and in your own hand.
  - (f) If you do not answer a question or wish to answer it later, write its question No, leave the appropriate blank space for it and go to the next question.
  - (g) Limit your answers to word limits as indicated.
  - (h) Do not write the questions on your answer book.
  - (j) Tag the answer book properly. Do not leave loose sheets otherwise transit loss may occur.
  - (k) Follow Staff Duties and abbreviations given in Joint Services Staff Duties Manual, Vol I.
  - (l) Try and answer the paper in three hours. However, if you take extra time, draw a red line indicating the portion covered in three hours. Also indicate at the end the total time taken. If you cannot sit continuously for three hours do a couple of questions – note the time taken and later carry on. This is not a good method as the tempo is broken, but it is better than nothing.
  - (m) Answer papers under exam like conditions, without taking outside help.
2. These instructions will not be repeated subsequently. Therefore do not misplace them. If there are any specific instructions, these will be given in respective papers. The total number of questions in test papers will also be indicated, there in.
3. Answer sheets will only be corrected which are received before **30 days** of the actual exam.
